# 2022 Saucon Valley Community Center Summer Program


Fees associated with the program are \$10 for the first child and \$5 for additional children in the same household. The programs will be held at Town Hall and Southeastern Parks (maximum of 60 children to be enrolled at each park). Enrollment is first-come, first-serve.

The first session runs from June 20<sup>th</sup> to July 15<sup>th</sup>, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to noon. There will be no program on July 4, 2022.

The second session will begin on July 18<sup>th</sup> to August 12<sup>th</sup>, Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

**Congratulations** to the first private residence in Lower Saucon Township that has been accepted for a listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The Wagner/Holum Farmstead borders Meadows Road, Saucon Creek, and the Saucon Rail Trail. This Farmstead was listed on the registry on July 23, 2020. It is one of 17 farmsteads listed in the entire state.

The property was once owned by an affluent family; the Wagners owned the property until 1971, a total of 219 years and 6 generations. The Wagners were not only successful German agricultural and husbandry farmers but also prosperous entrepreneurs. They owned the local grist mill (the Wagner Grist Mill now the site of the Hellertown Historical Society), a limestone quarry, had at least 3 lime kilns that furnished lime to local farmers as well as operated a mechanical threshing operation in the barn.

Christopher (Stoffel) Wagner Esq., acquired property of 184 acres from Thomas & Richard Penn in 1752. The property passed down from generation to generation and at one point ownership amassed over 428 acres.

The farmstead is an excellent example of a Germanic farm that existed in this area called the "Great Valley Agricultural Region." The property consists of an early Victorian period midcentury vernacular two-section brick house, the property's center piece is a large stone barn dated 1849, six smaller outbuildings adorn the picturesque property complete with a stone springhouse. Also, three other remnants of other buildings are visible.

Because of the barn's large footprint (40X80) and the most talented craftsman, carpenters, timber framers and stone masons that John Wagner could obtain with the skills he demanded, it resulted in a structure that has unmatched quality in workmanship of other barns and still retains its historic integrity. Upon visits by many barn experts the barn was termed -- "The Cadillac of Barns."

The restoration was a labor of love accomplished by the present owners, Gerald and Joanne Holum (owned since 1986).

# How Can I Be a Good Stormwater Neighbor?

Have you ever discussed stormwater with your neighbor or wondered how to be a better stormwater neighbor? Neighbor disputes over stormwater are very common. Water does not follow property boundaries and there are often instances where water flows from one property onto another and causes damage. It is important to realize that activities on your own property can adversely affect your neighbor's property.

The first thing to do as a responsible neighbor is to familiarize yourself with how stormwater flows on your own property. Ask yourself how does water enter and exit my property? Are there areas of concentrated flow currently causing damage to your property or adjacent neighboring property? If so, flows can be re-directed to vegetated areas for infiltration. You can also install a rain barrel, cistern, rain garden, or dry well as needed to control roof run-off.

When installing best management practices (or BMP's), do not direct stormwater flows onto a neighboring property and do not block stormwater from leaving your neighbor's property. Stabilize disturbed areas and maintain lawns, driveways, and gardens to prevent erosion and sedimentation on your own and on other peoples' properties. Changes from building and land development activities can alter natural flows of surface and stormwater. It is important to recognize that grading and re-grading can change how water moves across the land. It is essential to leave natural drainage paths undisturbed when possible and never intentionally concentrate stormwater flows.

If you live near a stream, pond, or stormwater drain you can plant a riparian buffer or establish a "grow zone" along the waterbody to allow pollutants to be filtered before reaching the water. This will help prevent erosion on your property. Also, do not compost yard waste such as leaves, grass clippings, or mulch into or near a stream or stormwater drain. Clean up trash, litter, and other debris that may clog a drain or small stream that could potentially cause flooding or pollution from water run-off.

If you find yourself in a dispute with a neighboring property owner over stormwater issues remember: open communication and cooperation can prevent stormwater issues and help resolve existing stormwater problems. If you have questions about local stormwater regulations, contact your municipality. It is important to take steps to protect natural water courses, infiltration areas, and drainage paths. Be mindful of how your actions can affect adjacent landowners and take steps to prevent damage not only on your own property but also on your neighbor's property.


