In Memory Of John Kalynych



It is with great sadness we announce the Line of Duty Death of Firefighter John Kalynych. At the time of his death, John served Lower Saucon Fire Rescue as Safety Officer and was the past Deputy Chief of Catasauqua Fire Department.

John dedicated his life in service to others, starting his career as a Firefighter and Emergency Medical Technician in the late 1980s. He is a life member of Hanover and Bethlehem Township Volunteer Fire Companies where he served in multiple leadership roles. John's contributions extended beyond the local level and across the region- serving Lehigh County Emergency Management as the Former

Chief of Special Operations (Technical Rescue and Hazardous Materials Response) and Director of Emergency Management where he was instrumental in guiding and developing the regional emergency response system. John also worked part time with the Lehigh County District Attorney's Office assigned to the Municipal Emergency Response Team (MERT).

John previously served the United States as a member of the Federal Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Team– PA Task Force 1 and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Emergency Management USAR as a member of PA Company 3.

John was passionate and dedicated to training. He served departments on the local level, and also traveled around the region as a Fire/Rescue Instructor for Bucks County Community College. John's experience and knowledge spanned firefighting, technical rescue and hazardous materials and he willingly shared this knowledge with others. No matter your skill or experience level, John always inspired others to continue their growth.

Along with being a dedicated member of emergency services, John was a proud father. In addition to his sons, he was a friend and mentor to countless Emergency Responders across the state.

We thank our regional partners for the outpouring of support. John's impact and legacy will never be forgotten.








Congratulations to...

Renaming of the Woodland Hills Preserve

The Woodland Hills Preserve, located on Countryside Lane, was recently renamed to "The Sandra Yerger Community Recreation Area and Nature Preserve" after Sandra Yerger, Council Member.

The Parks and Recreation Board of Lower Saucon Township made the recommendation to Council, and at the August 16th Council meeting, Council voted to rename the preserve after Sandy to recognize her years of dedication to the Township.

Sandy has been a Lower Saucon Township Council Member for more than 20 years, and spent most of her career at the Heritage Conservancy, a not-for-profit conservation organization that specializes in open space preservation. She was the founder of both the Environmental Action Committee (currently the Environmental Advisory Council) and the Open Space Program, and served as Chair to the Environmental Advisory Council for many years.

Her family placed their property in a conservation easement for preservation within the Township. She was a member of the Council that approved the purchase of the former Woodland Hills Golf Course, which has been preserved as community open space and recreation area. Sandy enjoys spending time in the open space properties with her family, and always has her dog by her side.

No Nonsense NEUTERING

Lower Saucon Township partners with No Nonsense Neutering (NNN) to offer our residents feral cat spay/neutering vouchers. These vouchers include one feral cat spay/neuter surgery, a rabies and distemper vaccine, nail trimming, ear cleaning, pain medication, and fluids. In addition, they are also providing flea, ear mite, and worm treatment. The left ear will also be tipped as it is a requirement for outside roaming cats.

To obtain a feral cat spay/neuter voucher from Lower Saucon Township, you must:

- 1. Schedule the appointment(s) by calling (866) 820-2510 ext. #2 (in Allentown) or schedule online by visiting their website at https://www.nnnlv.org/.
- 2. Apply for a voucher by either contacting Lower Saucon Township at (610) 865-3291 or in person at the Township Building. All vouchers must be picked up in person, and a copy of your driver's license and proof of your scheduled appointment is required.
- All vouchers are non-transferrable and can only be used by the person whose name it is issued in. ID will be required at the NNN check-in desk.
- Please keep in mind there is a limit of 5 vouchers a year per household, and all unused vouchers must be returned to Lower Saucon Township before the expiration date listed on the voucher.





MedReturn Drug Collection Unit

Residents who have expired or unused over-the-counter and prescription medications are able to discard those medications in a MedReturn drug collection unit, which is located in the front lobby of the Lower Saucon Police Department at 3700 Old Philadelphia Pike, Bethlehem, PA 18015.

Residents can place medications in the box anonymously, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. There will be no charge to residents for this service and no requirement to provide personal information or identification when using the box. Signs are posted on each box informing residents of the types of items that can be placed in the boxes and those that are not accepted.

Items accepted: prescription and over-the-counter medications, samples, vitamins, prescription ointments, prescription patches, and pet medications.

Items <u>NOT</u> accepted: syringes, needles, sharps, or other sharp objects, medications from businesses and clinics, lotions or liquids, aerosol cans, inhalers, hydrogen peroxide and thermometers.



Lower Saucon Township Projects

EASTON ROAD NEW 90' BASEBALL FIELD

Lower Saucon Council approved the construction of a new 90' baseball field to be built at Easton Road Park. The new baseball field will replace the two smaller existing fields, providing the Township with its first 90' field. The new field will have a grass infield, which along with the outfield, will be sodded to assist with making the field playable in the shortest time possible. This project was placed out to bid and the contractor approved to complete this project was the lowest bidder, CH-N Construction. Play Ball!

PICKLEBALL AT POLK VALLEY PARK

Lower Saucon Township Council voted at their meeting on July 26, 2023, to add 4 pickleball courts to Polk Valley Park. Pickleball is a racquet sport that is played on a court similar to a tennis court, but smaller. Council also approved paving the stone parking lot as part of this project. The courts are being constructed by the Public Works Department, and the construction began in September. We hope to see you all on the courts soon!

TOWN HALL PLAYGROUND

Lower Saucon Township was awarded \$264,030.00 through two state funding resources, Keystone Communities and State Share Local Gaming, to replace the playground at Town Hall Park by the baseball field. The park will feature something for all ages such as climbers, slides, rope tunnels, towers, catwalks, and more!



2023 STEEL CITY ROAD PAVING

Lower Saucon Township is excited to announce the Steel City paving project began in September. Council voted unanimously at their meeting on June 26, 2023, to approve the contract with Bracalente Construction, Inc. The bid received to complete this project was in the amount of \$826,627.50.

2023 Election Voter Referendum

Lower Saucon Township Council voted to ask our residents if you would like to see term limits for your Council Members. Currently, Council Members can serve as many terms as they are elected. When you visit the polls on the November 7, 2023, a question will be on the ballot asking for your opinion.

The question to be placed before the voters of Lower Saucon Township shall read as follows (this is the question that you will see on the ballot):

"Do you favor the adoption of an Ordinance that would amend the Township's Optional Plan of Government and Administrative Code to impose a two (2) consecutive term limitation (eight (8) total years) for Lower Saucon Township elected members commencing with the terms that begin on January 5, 2026, and continuing thereafter for all elected Council members; any years of service by an individual who was appointed to Council shall not be included in the 8 total year limitation. YES or NO?"

The plain English version of the above-listed question is as follows (this is an expanded version of the question):

The ballot question asks the voters of Lower Saucon Township whether the Township should adopt an Ordinance to amend the Township's Optional Plan of Government and Administrative Code to limit the number of terms that an elected Council Member can serve to two (2) consecutive terms or a total of eight (8) consecutive years. The Ordinance would contain an exception to the two (2) consecutive term limitation so that it only applies to elected terms and not to individuals who are appointed to the Council due to a vacancy, thus allowing an individual to fill a vacancy in the office of a Council Member and subsequently be elected to two (2) consecutive terms.

A vote of "YES" to the aforementioned ballot question approves the adoption of an ordinance by the Council of Lower Saucon Township, amending the Optional Plan of Government and Administrative Code, to impose a two (2) term limitation on individuals elected to the position of Council Member commencing with the terms that begin on January 5, 2026.

A vote of "NO" to the aforementioned ballot question would result in the continuation of the current Optional Plan of Government and Administrative Code that, together, allow elected Lower Saucon Township Council Members to serve in the position of Council Member for an unlimited number of terms.

The priority project for the Heller Homestead is to preserve the unique arch of the barn and remaining structure with the intention to eventually create a venue that will be used for public gatherings.




Fall is a beautiful time of year, and the Heller
