- LCD & CRT Televisions, Computers & Monitors: PCs & laptops
- Office Equipment: copiers, telephone & fax machines
- Computer Peripherals: keyboards, printers, scanners, cables, mouses
- Consumer Electronics: tape players, VCRs, PDAs, stereo equipment, radios, cell phones, etc.
- Media Storage: VHS tapes, cassette tapes, CDs, etc.
- Microwave ovens

Heavy Metals	Occurrence in E-Waste	
Arsenic	Small quantities in the form of gallium arsenide within light emitting diodes printer/copier drums	
Barium	CRT Getters, Plasma TVs	
Beryllium	Power supply boxes containing silicon controlled rectifiers, x-ray lenses, microwaves w/ ceramic insulators	
Cadmium	Rechargeable NiCd-batteries, CRT screen phosphor powder, printer inks & toners, photo copiers (printer drums)	
Chromium VI	Data tapes, floppy disks, Plasma TVs	
Cobalt	Plasma TVs and batteries	
Lead	CRT funnel, CRT frit, some Plasma TVs, batteries, printed wiring/circuit boards	
Mercury	Fluorescent lamps – backlighting in LCDs, CFLs, other lamps, mercury vapor, neon, ultraviolet digit light processing TVs, thermometers, thermostats, barometers, medical equipment electronic games and toys	
Nickel	Rechargeable Nickel Cadmium (NiCd) batteries, Nickel Metal Halide (NiMh) batteries, Plasma TVs	
Zinc	Batteries, Plasma TVs

An **electronic device** is anything with a circuit board- products with digital displays or programmable features. Pennsylvania instituted a law called the Covered Devices Recycling Act which prohibits residents from disposing of covered devices as trash, and bans haulers from collecting these items as trash. They must be recycled at an approved facility.

<u>Covered devices include</u>: Desktop Computers, Laptops, Monitors, Computer peripherals (keyboard, mouse, printer, speakers, etc.), Televisions, E-readers.

Other types of <u>electronic waste</u> include: cameras, cell phones, cell phone peripherals (chargers, batteries, Bluetooth ear pieces, air cards, clips, cases, etc.), DVD and VCR players, MP3 players, iPods, PDA's, portable electronic game players and video game consoles, stereos, CDS players, turntables, amplifiers, speakers, etc..



An average American household has about 25 electronic devices, as well as all the electronics used by businesses and institutions. Millions of these devices become obsolete each year. That is one reason why electronic waste is the fastest-growing waste stream in the United States.



Before recycling your computer or laptop protect yourself and your data. When selling, donating, or scrapping your old computers, be sure to remove all your personal or business data.

- Delete or destroy the entire hard drive, files deleted by dragging them to the recycle bin desktop icon can be easily recovered, via program software.
- Use a secure file deletion program to ensure the data can not be recovered. Delete all storage media: hard drives, tapes, etc. that are going with the computer.
- Always back up your data first.
