

GROWING DEMAND

LOCAL GAS DEMAND

Natural gas prices clearly demonstrate pipeline constraints between the Marcellus and eastern Pennsylvania and New Jersey markets – not substantial excess capacity like some claim. The unfortunate result is predictable price spikes, which will only worsen as demand increases, including every time the weather gets cold.

Regional demand by local natural gas distribution companies and natural gas-fired electric generators is growing. More and more homes and businesses are being constructed with natural gas service or converting from other fuels to natural gas due to its environmental and economic benefits. For example: UGI Utilities has converted 53,000 households to natural gas since 2008; New Jersey Natural Gas has forecast growth of approximately 28,000 customers over the next three years; and PSEG, South Jersey Gas and other local gas utilities also project growth.

The PennEast Pipeline is not being built in response to a single weather event. Rather, the Pipeline is being built in response to a market need as demonstrated by companies willing to sign long-term contracts to meet expected customer demand at the lowest cost.

LOCAL BENEFITS

PennEast will bolster the region's energy security by providing a clean, locally produced, long-term supply of natural gas to serve families, businesses and power generators and will alleviate a key point of congestion in the system. Natural gas users will benefit, but electric customers will benefit even more.

In fact, of the \$893 million in potential savings that could have been realized in the 2013/2014 winter had PennEast been in service, more than \$530 million of those savings would have gone to electric customers.

There is a good reason why more than 40 regional business and labor organizations support PennEast.



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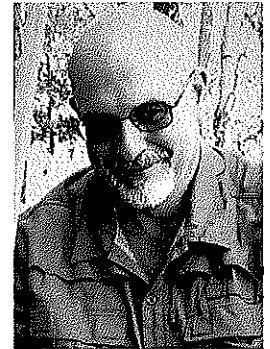
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MEET OUR TEAM

In spite of numerous and completely false claims to the contrary, the PennEast Pipeline is being built for local natural gas use. Families and businesses in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York will receive the natural gas and electricity derived from the PennEast Pipeline. Consolidated Edison, Elizabethtown Gas, New Jersey Natural Gas, PSEG Power, South Jersey Gas, UGI Energy Services, and others are among the local companies that have committed to using the natural gas transported through the PennEast Pipeline.

✓ SAFETY: HIGHEST PRIORITY

PennEast's highest priority is safety. The best practices and requirements for constructing and operating pipelines nowadays have improved significantly within the last 25 years. PennEast will meet or exceed stringent pipeline industry and regulatory standards. This includes testing welds, using state-of-the-art corrosion protection systems, regular leak surveys and 24/7 system monitoring.

Transmission pipeline incidents are rare, and pipelines are the safest and most environmentally friendly and efficient mode of transportation. For example, **to transport PennEast's daily 1 billion cubic feet of natural gas by truck would require 1,175 tractor trailers on the road every day** – increasing congestion and chances of roadway accidents, as well as added vehicle emissions.
