On Friday, August 3, 2018 the Lower Saucon Township Police Department joined the CRIMEWATCH Network to align our communication strategy with surrounding police agencies. This process meant that the Police Department switched to a new website and social media practice.

Lower Saucon Township Police Department is the first Northampton County based police department to go live on the CRIMEWATCH Network; a communications developed platform specifically for Pennsylvania law enforcement agencies that allows for geographically targeted sharing and intelligence gathering.

## Winter Driving Tips

Remember, if winter weather is forecast, eliminate all unnecessary travel.

- This will keep you and your family safe and allow clean-up crews to more easily perform its winter duties.
- Carry a winter emergency travel kit.
- Listen to weather and travel advisories, but if you don't have to travel in bad weather, don't.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full.
- Slow down and increase following distance.
- Avoid sudden stops and starts.
- Beware of roads that may look wet, but are actually frozen, often referred to as "black ice."
- Use extra caution on bridges and ramps, where ice can often form without warning.
- Carry a cell phone.
- Do not use cruise control while driving on snow-covered roads.
- State law requires you to turn on your headlights when your wipers are on.
- Use your low beams in particularly bad weather, especially in cases of heavy or blowing snow.
- Remove snow and ice from the hood and roof of your vehicle. State law states that if snow or ice from your vehicle strikes a vehicle or person and causes death or injury, you can be ticketed.
- Do not park or abandon your vehicle on snow emergency routes.
- Do not pass or get between trucks plowing in a plow line (several trucks plowing side by side).
- Make sure someone knows where you are going and when you expect to arrive, in case you run into an emergency.
- If you do become stranded, it's better to stay with your vehicle until help arrives. Run the engine every hour or so, but make sure the tailpipe is clear and keep the downwind window cracked open.
- Do not drink and drive, and always wear your seat belt.

Preparation is also key to successfully navigating winter roads. Winter weather can bring unexpected conditions, so make sure that both you and your vehicle are ready for ice and snow.





#### Life Stages of a Spotted Lantern Fly



The Spotted Lanternfly (SLF), *Lycorma delicatula*, is an invasive planthopper, native to China, that was first detected in 2014 in southeastern Pennsylvania. It feeds voraciously on many plants, including economically important crops like fruit trees, grapevines, hops, hardwoods, and ornamentals. If you think you have SLF, do not panic! First, make sure the insect you are seeing is the spotted lanternfly. Next report your sighting to 1-866-253-7189 or email **badbug.pa.gov**. Third, learn about its life cycle and habits. Fourth, determine what plants it is infesting and what it is not. Fifth, employ management strategies at the proper time of the year.

Spotted lanternflies are still concentrated in Southeastern Pennsylvania, encompassing a 13 county quarantine area. Agronomic crops are not their preferred host but if you see high numbers in field crops, please let us know.

FYI: Spotted lanternflies are now in the adult life stage (circled on the left) and are much more mobile. If you find any life stage of SLF in any area where it is known to exist, you should try to destroy it.

> Code of Appeals, Zoning Hearing Board, Planning Commission, Steel City Volunteer Fire Department, and Jr. Council members.






## Saucon Valley Compost Center

The Saucon Valley Compost Center will remain open

until November  $24^{\text{th}}$  (closed on November  $23^{\text{rd}}$ ). Hours of operation are Friday & Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The facility is closed December thru March with the exception of January  $5^{\text{th}}$ ,  $12^{\text{th}}$  &  $19^{\text{th}}$  when it will be open from 9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. for Christmas tree disposal.

The Township **does not** provide curbside leaf/brush pick up. Please take all yard waste (loads must be tarped) to the Compost Center during normal operational hours.

ID Cards are issued for residents at the Township building Monday thru Friday, during office hours with a current driver's license. Limit one per household. The Compost Center is located at 2011 Springtown Hill Road, Hellertown, PA 18055. #### **Winter Preparations**

**Who is responsible for clearing snow and ice from sidewalks?** According to Municipal Code of Lower Saucon Township (§140-17) property owners and/or occupants are responsible for keeping sidewalks clear of snow and ice.

Who clears the snow from fire hydrants? Our volunteer fire companies ask residents with fire hydrants near their properties to assist them by clearing ice and snow from around these hydrants.

**How long do I have to clear my sidewalk?** Within 36 hours of the end of any snowfall or accumulation of ice. Residents are also reminded not to throw snow from sidewalks and driveway onto roads.

What happens if I don't clear my sidewalk? Individuals and businesses who do not comply with the ordinance can face fines of \$50 or more set by the District Magistrate. Report violations to the Township providing the full address.

What happens if I am physically unable to clear my sidewalk? As a property owner, while you may be physically unable to clear your sidewalk yourself, it is still your responsibility to ensure that sidewalks along your property are cleared. Consider hiring a contractor or asking a neighbor to help.

How much snow do I need to clear to comply with the Ordinance? You should clear at least a 30" path along the sidewalk, where conditions allow. This width allows access by people in wheelchairs, people using strollers, students walking to school, and individuals with assistive devices.

**Can we park cars in our cul-de-sac when snow is in the forecast?** Township Ordinance No. 2011-11 restricts parking in all of the Township's cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets during the periods when Public Works is removing snow or ice. Please cooperate and move your car so we can clear these areas as quickly as possible.


How can I help to protect my sod from the plow? In order to assist the snow plow operators in determining the edge of your lawn, please place flexible, reflectorized snow markers which are available at your home improvement store at 50 foot intervals along your property. If no markers are in place and the Township plow tears up the sod in front of your property, it will **not** be repaired by the Township.

Non-resident rate is \$150.00 rental fee plus a \$50.00 deposit.
